<u>AUGUST 13 — Michael Joseph McGivney</u> (August 12, 1852 – August 14, 1890) was born to Irish immigrant parents from County Cavan - Patrick and Mary (Lynch) McGivney. He was the eldest of 13 children - Mary Ann, Rosanna, Margaret, John, and Patrick James; six died in childhood. His father worked as a molder in a CT brass mill. Michael attended the Waterbury school but left at 13 to work in the brass mill.

In 1868, at the age of 16, he entered the Séminaire de Saint-Hyacinthe in Saint-Hyacinthe, Quebec. He continued his studies at Our Lady of Angels Seminary, near Niagara Falls and at the Jesuits' St. Mary's College, in Montreal. He had to leave the seminary, returning home to help finish raising his siblings after his father's death in June 1873. McGivney later resumed his studies at St. Mary's Seminary, in Baltimore, and was ordained a Priest on December 22, 1877, by Archbishop Gibbons at the Cathedral of the Assumption.

At a historical time of anti-Catholic sentiment, McGivney worked tirelessly to offer practical solutions to immigrant Catholic communities in Connecticut. In 1882, with vision and zeal, founded a **Knights of Columbus** at Saint Mary's Parish, to serve as a mutual aid and fraternal insurance organization, particularly for immigrants and their families. Furthermore, the Knights of Columbus was founded to provide spiritual support to men and offer financial resources for families that had suffered the loss of the prime provider. Father Michael Joseph McGivney died on August 14, 1890, after amid a pneumonia pandemic.

December 18, 1997, Archbishop Daniel A. Cronin of Hartford, officially opens Father McGivney's cause

for Sainthood. On March 15, 2008, Pope Benedict XVI declared McGivney "Venerable" in recognition of his "heroic virtue". On May 27, 2020, Pope Francis announced that McGivney had been approved for Beatification. This action meant that McGivney can be declared "Blessed," the step just prior to Sainthood — an additional miracle attributed to McGivney's intercession will be required for his Canonization as a Saint. On October 31, 2020, the Mass for Beatification was celebrated in the Cathedral of Saint Joseph, Hartford.

An Apostolic Letter was read from Pope Francis that declared Father McGivney would now have the title of "Blessed Michael McGivney." Blessed Michael McGivney's Memorial is observed on August 13 — the day <u>in-between</u> his birthday of August 12 and of his death day of August 14.

From the National Archives:


The very first issue of *Columbia* Magazine was in <u>August 1921</u>, (10¢) and featured U.S. President Warren G. Harding on the cover and included his message about the new magazine: "That this publication, *Columbia*, will be devoted to American ideals of religion, fraternity and social welfare certainly suggests a platform on which all Americans can stand." (WGH)

Columbia Magazine celebrated the Centennial of Father McGivney's birth with an August 1952 cover story titled "With Vision, Zeal and Charity," which chronicled the K of C founder's life and legacy. "He was a good priest who was known for his exceptional charity; he was a hard working priest ... and he was a determined priest."

"His kindliness enabled him to get along well with men and to persuade as well as to inspire them to carry out plans he conceived."

K of C Hall on Fire: On Friday, July 9, at 2:30 pm, fire broke out at the home of the Knights of Columbus Hall Chartiers Council 875 in Crafton. 8 communities battled the two-alarm fire for two hours. The fire caused the roof to collapse. One firefighter was injured and another taken to a hospital. The building belonged to the Knights since the 1930s and housed offices and storage and various events.

The Legion of Mary (Latin: Legio Mariae) was founded in Dublin, Ireland, on 7 September 1921, by Frank Duff. It is an international association of members of Lay—Catholics whose volunteer members give service to the Church. The object is the Glory of God through the holiness of its members developed by prayer and active co-operation in Mary's and in the Church's work. The Legion holds weekly meetings, where prayer is intermingled with reports and discussion. The members participate in the life of the parish through visitation to families, the sick — both in homes and in hospitals, and in missionary need sponsored by the parish. Every Legionary is required to carry out a weekly apostolic work in the spirit of faith and in union with Mary. "For all states of the Laity the perfect example of spiritual and apostolic life is the most Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of Heaven, who while leading the life common to all here on Earth, one filled with family concerns and labours, was always intimately united with her Son and in an entirely unique way co-operated in the work of the Saviour . . All should devoutly venerate her and commend their life and apostolate to her maternal care". Vatican II: Pope John Paul II "Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity." The Passionist Nuns - Pittsburgh Convent: (part of the Passionist Community at the beautiful St. Paul of the Cross Monastery - founded in 1852 - on the South Side hilltop. A worldwide Congregation of Priests, Brothers, and Nuns, dedicated to keeping alive the memory of the Passion of Jesus Christ and ministering to Him in the vast suffering of the many people, today.)

USA/Pittsburgh Founded: July 10, 1910 (111 y), then Convents in Scranton, Kentucky, Missouri; and originally in 18 countries.

The Passionist Nuns of Pittsburgh, PA, is the first community of Passionist Nuns in the USA, founded on July 10, 1910 by five Passionist Nuns from Tarquinia, Italy. (*On the Internet*, view the Orders very original founding on 21 November 1720 - 301 years ago, by Saint Paul of the Cross.)

The emphasis: We are a contemplative cloistered community of religious women called to stand at the foot of the Cross with Mary near the Heart of Christ, ready to receive His love so that we might become love in the Heart of the Church. By the charismatic grace of the Spirit, we are consecrated by vow to the Mystery of the Passion which gives inspiration and unity to our lives. Rooted in the Paschal Mystery, we participate in the redemptive mission of Christ's Passion, a silent but powerful apostolate which benefits everyone by our love, prayer, and suffering, in union with Jesus.

(from memory: On certain religious days and especially during Lent, the Nuns would bake various breads and offer [\$] them to the Public. And with those baking facilities, the Community was a major supplier of new unconsecrated hosts.)

Do you have a yearning to be a radiant witness to His mercy and tenderness for all, especially for the suffering and the spiritually poor? Do you have the affective, cultural, and spiritual maturity to live in solitude as well as in a close knit community? Do you have good physical health and psychological balance? If you are an unmarried woman between the ages of 21-40, a practicing Roman Catholic in love with our Lord and His Church, and have answered "yes" to the above questions, please share with us for a few days of discernment. 
