The Catholic Church dedicates the **entire month of November** to **the Holy Souls in Purgatory.** November 2nd is **All Souls Day.** During this entire month we pray for the Souls of the faithful departed, especially those whom we have known and loved.

The **Souls in Purgatory** died in the mercy of God, this is why they are called Holy; however, because they still had an attachment to sin at the time of their death, they must undergo a *Spiritual Purification* of their souls before they are able to fully love God with their whole heart, mind, and soul, and for all eternity.

All are meant to die after living as saints. Those who die in the love of God fall short of holiness due to habitual sins that must be purified before being admitted to the beatific vision of God. The place of this purification is **Purgatory.**

The Liturgical Color is <u>Green</u> which is the symbol of Hope and the color of the sprouting seed that arouses in the faithful the Hope of reaping the eternal harvest of Heaven, especially the Hope of a glorious resurrection. The last portion of the Liturgical Year represents the time of our pilgrimage to Heaven during which we hope for a reward. The last Sunday, which marks the beginning of Advent, the Liturgical Color changes to <u>Purple</u>, representing the time for Penance.

"All who die in God's grace, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the eternal joy of heaven." (CCC 1030).

Let us Pray: Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord; And let the perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.

O Lord, who art ever merciful and bounteous with Thy gifts, look down upon the suffering souls in purgatory. Remember not their offenses and negligence's, but be mindful of Thy loving mercy. Cleanse them of their sins and fulfill their ardent desires that they may be made worthy to behold Thee face to face in Thy glory.

May they soon be united with Thee and hear those blessed words which will call them to their heavenly home: "Come, blessed of My Father, take possession of the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."





Nicholas of Tolentino: (circa 1246 – 10 September 1305) is known as **The Patron Saint of Holy Souls**, is also considered as a Patron Saint against **epidemic diseases**. He was born in Pontano, Italia, to middle-aged parents who had been childless. They prayed at The Shrine of Saint Nicholas of Myra for his Intercession, and, when the lady became pregnant, they named their son after the Saint.

A studious, kind, and gentle youth, at the age of sixteen, Nicholas became an Augustinian Friar and at the age of 25 was Ordained, and soon became known for his Preaching and Teachings as well as his attention to the poor and starving. Nicholas is said to have received

Visions of the Blessed Mother, Saint Augustine, Angels, a deceased monk, plus Images of Purgatory, which friends ascribed to his lengthy Spirituality Praying for The Souls in Purgatory.

Nicholas died on September 30, 1305, and in 1446 was Canonized by Pope Eugene IV; at this ceremony, Nicholas was credited with three hundred miracles plus three Resurrections. In 1884, Nicholas was proclaimed **Patron of The Holy Souls in Purgatory**, by Pope Leo XIII. *Feast Day is September 10*.



This November 15 is the Feast Day of
Albertus Magnus / Albert the Great (c. 1200?-15 Nov. 1280)
He was a German Catholic Dominican friar, philosopher, scientist, and Bishop. Later canonised as a Saint, he was known during his lifetime as Doctor universalis and Doctor expertus and; late in his life, the term of sobriquet Magnus was appended to his name. He is referred to as the greatest German philosopher and theologian of the Middle Ages. This distinguishes him as one of the 36 Doctors of the Catholic Church, plus the Patron Saint of Scientists.

Here in Carrick-Baldwin, the **Blessed Trinity Parish** was established on October 15, 2018. It includes the Churches of Saint Albert the Great, Saint Basil, Holy Angels, Saint Sylvester, and, Saint Wendelin; **the Saint Albert the Great site** is the main Administrative Center. *website*: www.blessedtrinitypgh.org

<u>Historically</u>, the original **Saint Albert the Great Parish** was established in 1956. Then, the Church was a combination of a church and sa chool building and was completed in 1958.
